### 5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

The College Placement Cell (CPC) provides career guidance in the area of higher studies, internships and full-time placements. Apart from final placements, it arranges internship opportunities. TCS also offered "Open Ignite", an employment opportunity in the form of webbased learning platform to the students from Department Computer Science. It helps the science students to launch their career, by improving their chances of being employed.

The Placement cell in 2016-17 continued to help students assess their skills along with providing them access to opportunities. To continue working towards this goal, the cell collaborated with Aspiring Minds and organised AMCAT, a computer adaptive test that measures job applicants on critical areas like communication skills, logical reasoning, quantitative skills and job specific domain skills.

The Department of Psychology runs a counselling Cell 'Çounslenza' to aid students on various issues academic or otherwise. Certificate programmes in German, French and add on course in Radio Broadcasting for the students have been initiated to provide students an opportunity to explore the areas and consider them as future career options. Guest talks on stock markets etc. are organized to apprise students on careers in these fields.

## **Best Practices**

### Making the campus Eco-friendly

One of the best practices adopted by the college is in making the campus eco-friendly.

- Environment clubs play an important role in creating environmental awareness amongst the future generation as well as motivation towards preserving the environment.
- It also enables the students to be sensitive towards environmental concerns so as to be able to tackle environmental problems.
- The objective of the club is to educate the students about their environment and to create a clean and green consciousness among students.
- It helps to mobilize students towards scientific enquiry into environmental problem so as to involve them in efforts to preserve environment.

### **Activities to make eco-friendly campus:**

- An herbal garden is made within the premises of the college. An area was selected according to the amount of sunlight being received by the area. Herbal saplings were planted and watered regularly. Along with thyme and rosemary, herbs like fenugreek, mint and coriander are also grown. The herbs are being used by the hostel and college faculty members.
- Action based activities like tree plantation and creating compost pits for procuring organic manure.
  - The tree plantation event was conducted in collaboration with the students and the nodal officer of NSS.
  - Compost pits have been created to procure environment-friendly organic manure.
     Information regarding the appropriate dimensions of the compost pit was gathered both on-line as well as by talking to an expert.
- Promotion of ethos of conservation of water by minimizing the wastage of resources.
- A talk was organized by WDC and IQAC on environment and health hazards. Prof. Rita Singh apprised the faculty and students about the chronic health hazards that arise due to the use of plastics. The talk had a positive impact on the audience.

#### Attendance system is online

A new dynamic Students' Attendance System was designed and developed by the college employees without any cost. With this system, the faculty members can now fill the monthly attendance through their login-id. Instantly the uploaded attendance can be viewed on the website by students and by their parents. The software also has a monitoring system that enables the authority to keep a track on timely attendance updates. This has significantly minimized the manual intervention / dependency and has completely eliminated the paper work.

Radio presenter/ Radio announcer/ Radio jockey, Radio interview/ Radio discussion/ Radio Talk, Conducting workshops (Tour to Delhi University Community Radio), Assignments and their assessment.
